



The Driving Machine: A Design History of the Car

The best way to get a miscellaneous group of people talking enthusiastically together is to bring up the subject of movies. But there's another surefire conversation igniter: **CARS.** We tend to take cars personally, or at least more personally than any other large machines such as graders and tractors (except David Weber). A car can support, encourage, soothe and occasionally infuriate. Now that it is summer you'll be driving along sometimes wet roads.

The Driving Machine is written by Witold Rybczyski - Norton - For Sale for \$29.99

The author begins at the beginning – of his own driving history. His first car was a Volkswagen Beetle bought in 1967. The design was already 30 years old and production would continue for another 36 years, making it the world's longest-running automobile model. This little car had been promiscuously scattered across half the globe. Witold got it in Hamburg and drove it through the Netherlands on his way to Paris. He collected some dirty looks there, especially from older persons for whom the war-time German occupation was a living memory.

At the 1933 Berlin Motor Show, soon after being appointed Reich Chancellor, Adolf Hitler announced that the auto industry would produce an affordable people's car, a 'Volkswagen'. The VW's creator was Ferdinand Porsche as seen in the photograph below with Hitler in 1937.





Rybczynski includes Carl Benz, Paul Daimler and Henry Ford in his book, 'The Driving Machine, A Design History of the Car'. In 1885 Benz gave the world its first successful internal combustion motorcar. The first automobiles were only for the rich but that didn't last long. In America, Henry Ford put the nation on the road beginning in 1908 with his world-changing Model T which he produced in staggering numbers on the assembly line he pioneered. The author deals with the emergence of the Sports Car mainly due to the influx of British examples.

'Cars, unlike buildings have a relatively short life. Fortunately in Australia, many vehicles stay on the roads if they are older than 30 years because they are eligible for a special interest registration and cheaper insurance. Many IVVVC members take advantage of this.






The **NSU Ro 80** was a four-door, front engine executive sedan manufactured by the West German firm **NSU** from 1967 until 1977. It was ten years ahead of itself. Beneath that striking, wind-cheating shape was an audacious twin-rotary engine, with disc brakes and a semi-automatic clutchless gearbox. In 1967, the **Ro 80** won the acclaimed 'Car of the Year' award. Technical pre-eminence aside, it also handled like a kart – its stability, roadholding, ride, steering and dynamic balance were exceptional.





NSU's brave new Wankel power unit was flawed and due to acute rotor rip wear, would expire after only 24-32000 kms. The engine suffered from construction faults had had poor fuel economy. There was a weak understanding of the Wankel engine by dealers and mechanics which did not help the situation. While over 37000 were built, **NSU** honoured their warranty claims until they bled white and eventually Audi/VW took over, axing the **Ro 80** in 1977.



3 Do tyres have expiry Dates?

Tyres don't last forever and old tyres can be a serious safety risk. As tyres age, cracks may form beneath the surface causing the tyre to fail under load. If you haven't done so recently, it could be time to check how old the tyres on your vehicle are and if they need replacing. Read on to find out how to check the age of your tyres and stay safe on the road.



Check the age of a tyre by looking for the 10 to 12 digit serial tyre identification number found on the tyre's sidewall. The identification number is usually preceded by the acronym 'DOT' for example DOT EL CB DKE 1800. (Tyres manufactured before 2000 – DOT XYZ WTI 188)

Most tyre companies and tyre fitters recommend that tyres should last for 5 to 10 years.


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
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
