
All positions having been filled and confirmed and accepted David vacated the chair.

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
VALE David Arthur Roberts 16July1940 – 2 July 2024




David was the youngest of three boys and lived at his family home in Randwick, NSW, until his marriage to Lorraine in 1966.

David completed his secondary schooling at South Sydney High School obtaining his Intermediate Certificate in 1955. His first job was working as a message boy for the Commonwealth Dental Supply Co. but after 2 months his father insisted, "You've got to get a Trade!" On 16th January 1956, following an interview with the superintendent responsible for setting up the Austin plant, he commenced a 5-year apprenticeship as a Fitter and Turner with the Austin Motor Co/BMC. He was one of the first apprentices at the Austin Motor Co at Zetland. His pay was 3 pounds 10 shillings a week plus a 20 pence attendance bonus every 3 months.







Machines from Longbridge UK arrived weekly and were put in place by two Stacatruc forklifts. Twenty tradesmen from Longbridge were in Australia on a 2-year contract. They were there to assist the local tradesmen assemble and start up the plant. For the next four years David worked throughout the Austin Motor plant gaining invaluable experience in all departments.

One of David's jobs was to test drive new cars, the 1500 Wolseley or Lancers on day trips to Bathurst or Goulburn. Wow! what an experience for an 18-year-old! In 1961, David finished his 5 years apprenticeship.

David worked in many jobs throughout NSW and Queensland some being -The Cockatoo Island Dockyards, Garden Island, undertaking work on both Naval and Merchant ships including HMAS Stuart, HMAS Voyager, and HMAS Anzac, Commonwealth Engineering and Evans Deakin at Kangaroo Point shipyards.

In August 1964, David was 24 and joined the Merchant Navy as a Junior Engineer with Port Line on MV "Port Pirie" sailing from Sydney to London. His first port of call on this voyage was Brisbane and he remembered it as just bush, a country town.

David continued his love of the ocean and Brisbane's Moreton Bay, and particularly Russell Island. In July 2003 David and Lorraine joined the AMVCQ and enjoyed many outings with the club. Together they looked after Membership and Postage of the Austin Times at one stage and arranged name badges for new members together with members' year badges.

He was happy to share his knowledge of Austins and all things BMC with members and loved his 1960 Wolseley 15/60.

Allan John Waller

Allan was born in December 1942 and lived most of his early life in the Salisbury area of Brisbane. He married Margaret in 1970 and they moved into a newly built house in Sunnybank. He bought an Austin A40 Devon to restore and was a member of the Austin A40 Club in NSW. In 1981 Allan, Margaret and two others – Greg Peat and Terry Jorgensen decided to start a Queensland branch catering to all Austins. The first meeting was held on July 24th 1981, and the Club has prospered ever since. Allan was member No 2, and also President for the first year.

He had many interests apart from Austins; he was Member No 1 of the Historic Commercial Vehicle Association of Qld, Mount Gravatt Men's Shed, the Number Plate Collector's Club, the Coopers Plains History Group, and was involved with many charities.

As an early member of the AMVCQ, he held a number of positions, including President, Vice President, Secretary, Rally Organiser, Sub Editor and Librarian. He also came up with the idea of calling the newsletter 'Austin Times' starting off in April 1982.

At many outings and Club meetings, he often bought one of the numerous overseas students that he and Margaret had as home-stays. They were mainly from Japan, Taiwan and South Korea, and in the early days his foster-daughter Connie also came along.

He had a great sense of humour; his laugh was infectious, but he was always very modest about his achievements. Certainly a great practical joker – more than one person wondered why their car was making a strange whistling noise, only to find a teapot whistle on their exhaust pipe, or a bra hanging off the boot lid handle when on a club outing.

He also encouraged younger members of the club, and was notable in that he welcomed any new-comer at meetings, showing them around finding out what they owned and then introducing them to those who had similar cars. Allan owned among other things, an A40 Devon, two or three A40 Tourers, a ute painted in Austin service colours, and he still owned a 1956 Austin A40 Countryman.

Allan and Margaret had just celebrated their 54th wedding anniversary the day before Allan passed away at home. He had attended the Club meeting on the Thursday night before that. He said to me a couple of weeks before that, "I've had a really good life" and we would agree that he had indeed, as well as enriching others. Nairn Hindhaugh














Jumpers and Jazz

PHANTOM CORSAIR, is a prototype automobile built in 1938.

designed by Rust Heinz of the H. J. Heinz family, and Maurice Schwartz of the Bohman & Schwartz coachbuilding company in Pasadena, California.

The Phantom Corsair had no design precedent. Its streamlined shape was totally original and highly advanced, because of its futuristic features, and styling cues such as faired-in fenders and a low profile. Its steel-and-aluminium body measured just 57 in (140 cm) in height and incorporated fully skirted wheels and completely flush fenders while forgoing running boards. 2-door 5/6 seater sedan car also lacked door handles, as the doors were instead opened electrically using push-buttons located on the exterior and the instrument panel.

Heinz's sudden death in a car accident in July 1939 ended plans for mass, production leaving the prototype Corsair as the only one ever built.

The Phantom Corsair now resides in the National Automobile Museum (also known as The Harrah Collection) in Reno, Nevada. Price \$24 000 in 1938.

Dear Sirs,

BONNET SAFETY CATCH

The operation of this catch is controlled by two springs - one on the safety catch itself, and one which returns the hand release lever.

It has been established that, on initial production on a number of cars, these latter springs were omitted. Whilst there is only a remote possibility of the bonnet inadvertently flying open due to this omission, since the lever spring itself should prove adequate, as the cars are presented to you for service, would you kindly check and ensure that this spring is fitted.

The correct item is Part No. 4G2494 and fits in the holes provided between the hand release lever and the lateral bonnet stiffener.
