Entries close: 11th April, 2025 **Eligibility:** Members of the Chrysler Restorers Club of Australia in NSW, South Australia and Victoria are eligible to enter.

Accommodation: Entrants should book their own accommodation. The

suggested booking time is Sunday 28th September – Sunday 5th October 2025.

Many of the South Australian entrants have already booked at either the Griffith Tourist Caravan Park (02 6964 2144) where they have powered sites and cabins available or at the Centrepoint Apartments (02 6960 2000) where they have Motel Rooms or 1 and 2 bedroom apartments.

We have found that accommodation in Griffith is booking out fast. If you are thinking of attending the National Rally please book your accommodation as soon as possible.

You will be asked to give a credit card number as security but you will not be charged for the accommodation until closer to the booking time.

You are able to cancel reservations up to 48 hours prior to check in without penalty at most places.

At this point in time we are aware of approximately 11 entrants from South Australia who are attending the rally and have secured their accommodation.

Meals & Activities: Once entries have closed in April, 2025. Entrants will be contacted to take orders for daily meals and activities.

Hamley Bridge is an easy hours drive north of Gepps Cross and this run attracted 45 club members and a variety of classic cars.



INT Had a lot of wood rot in it?

C H It did have a lot of wood rot in it and so I got really enthusiastic and started. And I began one of those exercises where you think, well, OK, this is a bit beyond my skills, all the woodworking and you know, stuff like that. Nor did I have a lot of skills in metal forming. Somewhere around this time we had quite a group undertaking various restorations. I remember Keith Lucas dearly wanting my De Soto. He had already completed a sedan and had a 56 De Soto. My neighbour Dennis had a '25 Maxwell half finished. So there we all were chatting one night, and we decided to swap projects around -Keith got my De Soto, I got the Maxwell from Dennis and he got the '56 Desoto from Keith, so in one fluid movement all cars changed hands. Life was a bit simpler back then.

So as time progressed, this sort of cottage industry started up in the northeast suburbs.

Keith was good with metal work, Rick Frith did paint, Graham Bailey did woodwork, Neil Wormald did upholstery, Dick Hart was the all rounder and I did some of the black hand stuff.


In amongst all this, we made steady progress on my Maxwell. It was now residing in a corner of Neil Wormald's business premises, which had now turned into a workshop. So I have to say that I am forever grateful because I don't think I ever paid these guys enough, if anything at all. They actually upholstered and repainted it for me and I bought a wiring loom and all that sort of stuff. Rick Frith did the painting. Neil Wormald largely did yes, all the upholstery and the hood. We swapped trades, but I'm sure I, by a long stretch, got the better end of it. Anyway, so my first real exercise in restoring an old wooden

wheeler was basically the Maxwell. The De Soto having gone to Keith who completed a wonderful restoration and then ultimately it went to Alan Martin.

INT And then, for your sins, you bought a Royal

CH Well, that came about quite by accident and I didn't actually really want it. So there I was, probably 2/3 of the way through the Maxwell restoration (so we're talking, I don't know, mid 90s, early 90s I think it was) and as you did back in the day, you'd get a letter to the Secretary, to put something in the For Sale notices. This fellow from Kilburn. wrote in and said he's got this 1957 Chrysler Royal and he lost his licence or had given up his licence, he's in his 80s and he wanted to sell it, to go to a good home. Anyway he wasn't far from me and of course I think I might have been on the committee at that time so I said I would go and have a look at it. I would get the facts and figures and take some photos, get them developed and bring them to a meeting.

So I went down and had a look at this Royal and took some photos and it was still driving. It was in a shed, where you were able to just crack the door open about 6 inches and worm your way in. But it was



undercover and I think he hadn't driven it for a few months. So one of the things I said, well, can we start it up and back it out? And we did and we got it started and backed it out, and it's really ,really hard to move and I thought well the brakes are dragging on it, and he said no, no the brakes should be alright they were only just done up; he had receipts in the glove box. He'd taken it to a brake mob and, long story short, this brake mob had no idea what they were doing and all the adjustments were out, so all brakes were binding.

Anyway I think he might have wanted three grand for it, two to three grand somewhere in that that range. But he was adamant that he

didn't want it to go to a young Hoon and be a hot rod, and you know wide wheels and lowered and all of that. I didn't know anything about Royals at the time. I knew of them, and I thought, well, OK, push button V8 and yeah, it's a nice car. The upholstery was good, bit of paint fade, but yeah, substantially a fairly, you know, drive home car after sorting the brakes.

And so to the next meeting and pass it around on the clipboard with the photos, and then come another meeting and it passed around again. There was no interest at all. And in that era, so again, we're talking early to mid 90s, the Royals weren't on the horizon, they've been and gone. Everybody now wanted Valiants. And if they didn't want Valiants, then they'd want the 1929 De Sotos you know. So this is sort of a void as far as Royals are concerned. So I just said, to my wife at the time, I think this is too good to pass up. Really, if I take it home and put it in the shed and get back to it later, it will be worthwhile. So subsequently I did buy it and probably one of the better moves that I've made because I've still got it today and it's an absolutely wonderful car and always has been.

INT You've used that, travelled near and far, with the caravan on the back.

C H We did, we've had lots of journeys in it. At one point we decided to get into the vintage caravanning thing, and that came about by again, me being on the committee, and somebody saying there's a caravan up at Highbury, just up the road. A lady there, a deceased estate, wants to sell it. Would you go up and take some photos of it. And you know, at that point I've done no caravanning at all. I went up there and it was a 1964 Globetrotter, built here in Adelaide. Globe Products were the offshoot of the people who made the motorbike wheels and alloy casting. Yeah. well, they've taken a side step at some point and got into

caravans construction.

Anyway I went up there and it was under a carport, under a shelter with a cover over it. And it was largely bond wood and aluminium roof, but it was bond wood and it was just on the cusp of that era where they changed from wooden to aluminium caravans. So I pulled the cover off up, stepped back and I went "Oh wow, look at this thing!" So I came home and I said, Cath, you're really gonna have to come and have a look at this. Of course she said. all the sensible things what are we gonna do with it? Where are we gonna put it? You know, yada, yada, yada. And I said, look, if for no other reason, just come up and have a look at it. So we got in the car and went up the road to Highbury, and drove up into the front yard, went around the shed and she went "Oh my goodness!"

So you know, that was a bit of a no brainer; we bought the Globetrotter. We towed it as far west as Ceduna and as far east as Canberra. That was a notable trip because that was the Chrysler Nationals in Canberra sometime in the late 90s, The rally commenced on a weekend, so I think we gathered at Tailem Bend on a Wednesday. We brought it home from storage a day or two before we packed it up, and we were set for an early start next morning. So I thought that I would get the Royal out and hook it up the previous evening. Backed it down the driveway. There's a three point turn. Put it in reverse and bang, suddenly we're going nowhere.

INT Failure to proceed again.

C H FTP times 2 What's the matter, the engines revving away. I'm broadside across the street going nowhere. OK. what are we going to do here because you know. 2 ton of Chrysler Royal across the street with an uphill driveway in itself is a bit of a problem, let alone progressing to hooking up the van and hauling it over to Canberra.

So I pushed the drive button and went forward and I went that's surprising because I was thinking a broken axle. So it went forwards and now how can I get straightened up in the street here as I'm pointing in the wrong direction. And I thought, well, I have to go forward, drive around the block, come back into my street and up my driveway and into the shed, which has a pit in it, which I did. So I'm of course, all the while waiting for some crunching noise, coming out of the transmission. Nope, went fine, went forward. Got it over the pit and it

just wouldn't go back. So at least I've now got the car in the shed, pointing into the shed and not being able to go anywhere and its 7 or 8 at night. We thought, right, well, there goes that Canberra tour. But I said to Cath, look I'll jump in the pit and I'll get underneath and I'll get my ear probe thingy and I'll put it on the transmission and see if I can find any noises. You push drive and reverse up there, push buttons. None of this proved anything. I could go forward. I couldn't go backwards it made no other strange noises. And I thought. well, ****.

OK, we have a lot invested here. We got the caravan, we got accommodation, we got all of that sort of stuff and it'll go forward. fine, but it won't go backwards. So we toss the coin and we said, OK, why don't we roll it? Push it back down the driveway. across the road to a vacant block and manually

wheel the caravan to it and hook up. And so we got there - what the heck - lets drive to Tailem Bend tonight and see if we can make Tailem Bend, because if we can pull it up over Mount Lofty and it doesn't fail, then we might be able to do this without reverse. So we rang up at 8:00 at night. We've got a vacancy at a caravan park, and off we went. We flew up over Mount Lofty and over the top and onto the freeway and all the way till we reached our site, all OK and no noises. So we left it hooked up and woke up the next morning and then headed off. Subsequently we did that whole round trip, three or four days or whatever it took us, to Canberra. By the time we met up with a group, we had lots of willing hands to push the caravan where we needed to. So we did that particular trip all the way around and back home in the Royal with caravan and no reverse.

The only time we came unstuck was at Balranald, a big truck stop. So it's got a huge car park. What we'll do is we'll go down and park in amongst the trucks, right down in that corner of the car park there, so that we've got room to come out forward. We filled up and then we went and parked. Would you believe when we got back, there was a car parked in front of us in this 20 acre car park!

INT You're going well today. Now, after 20 years of ownership, you quit the S series.

CH I did.

INT So what is it, about 20 years?

C H Yeah, yeah, there's a cycle.

INT The Air Force, 20 years.

C H Yeah, because of course I then had the Maxwell. I had the Royal and I think it was about the time that I moved from Greenacres over

to here and I thought with this single driveway house and a big shed at the back, there was just no way I'm gonna actually have three cars and be able to store them, so something's got to go

INT So you thought.

C H Well, that turned out to be a lie, but anyway, that was my rationale at the time. The other thing was, you know, I was still working and Cath had a modern car, so we had a modern family car, and the S series just wasn't getting any use, and one thing led to another. Advertised it in the newsletter and somebody bought it and it disappeared off the face of the earth. I don't know where it went.

INT And then you bought a ute ...

C H That was out of curiosity, a VG. What I have is a VG Dodge ute. You know, that in itself is different, not a Valiant, a Dodge Ute. So let me flesh that out a bit.

I think at the time, we used to get Auto Trader every week, something like that. I used to buy that simply because I think I was still buying Maxwell bits or Royal bits, and you know, I'd buy it once a week. Anyway, I saw this ad down at, somewhere near Victor Harbour with this VG Ute with a slant 6 engine in it and I thought "Oh that's not right." So I rang this guy up; it turned out to be a retired dealer whose name I've forgotten.

He'd bought a farm near Victor Harbor and he bought the ute at an auction and he'd used it to collect firewood etc. So I said Slant 6? Yeah, yeah, yeah. It's got a slant 6. And I said, well, it's been transplanted. He said no, no, its a Dodge. I said Dodge and it's got a slant 6 in it and I thought, this caught my curiosity be cause I knew nothing about these.

Let's go down there and look, subsequently it turns out there's actually an ex PMG vehicle. And you know, again, it was one of those learning phases where I suddenly became aware that Chrysler at Tonsley did a lot of government contract type vehicles and they would do the poverty pack version. Bare minimum like painted bumpers, painted grills, painted hubcaps and all that.

With the VG, as we know, they introduced the Hemi 6, but they obviously had a whole bunch of slant sixes lying around, which they could utilise on cheap bloody car builds. So there are lots, as it turned out, that the councils, utility companies etc. would ask for them to be built as what they call an SOA. It is the terminology that was used, and that was the first time I'd come across it, SOA is Special Order Authority, so this was something that was different than the normal run of the mill down the production line. So they take a bunch of cars, run them separately, build them and I had this red PMG ute.

This guy was using it on the farm and I thought that's odd enough to probably grab it. He didn't want a lot of money for it. They've been throwing farm implements and wood and all of that inside the tray, so the inside wheel arches and things are like the craters on the moon, you know, but substantially it was still quite a good car, and I felt that's odd enough. But I reckoned if I have that, I might be able to go and pick up engine blocks and you know all manner of things like that. So yeah, that's what happened, the VG Ute came into being.

INT We might take a pause there ...

Jeff's Big Ride

Hello everyone, my name is Jeff Knowles and I have been a member of this great club for 16 years,

I am also the current Historic Vehicle Registrar.

I'd like to share a fundraising experience with you all that I did for the month of March.

As some of you may know I had a partial knee replacement 18 months ago and after all my rehabilitation I decided to get out of the gym and buy a new bike to try to stay fit and healthy.

I saw a post on Facebook a few times encouraging people to get fit and ride 200km for the month of March, all for a charity called Camp Quality that specialises in children with cancer.

I thought why not and joined up and started fundraising for this worthy cause.

I am proud to say that I raised \$2011.07 (some of this was from club members) and rode a total of 248km. All of this was done on bike trails around Adelaide, Barossa and country areas.

I decided that bike trails were much safer than riding on the road and managed to find quite a few.

The first week I rode from Sandy Creek to Tanunda, following a trail through wineries that was 21km.

The next day I rode from Hillbank to Bolivar and return, 30km.

Two days later I rode along the beachfront from Semaphore to Osborne and return 23km.

Another two days later I rode from Vale Park to Athelstone on the linear bike trail as far as it goes and return. Total 29.42km.

That was 103km in the first week, I was really keen, and just as well as the following week we had that heatwave – no riding that week!

So a week later I finished the ride from Bolivar to Port Adelaide (for coffee) and return 32.51km and would you believe I got absolutely soaked on the way home!

Then we went away in our caravan, so no riding for 4 days then work commitments, I finally got back on the bike and rode 43km from Vale Park through Adelaide and down to Henley beach for coffee and return.

Time was running out for the month so I rode 26km from home to Globe Derby and back on a nice bike trail. After this ride I finally reached my goal of 200 km.

The last day of March I decided that I was not finished yet and loaded up the car and headed to Riverton to ride the Rattler trail, it was 33°C and a dusty trail but I made it to Auburn and return for a total of 42km.

So a grand total of 248km.

Once again I'd like to thank everyone for their kind donations and I'm looking forward to my next challenge.

Barossa Rally November 2023

Having spent a week touring with our Dodge Brothers friends, my brother-in-law, Ron Discombe, and I decided it was time to head home. Today the weather was predicted to hit 40 degrees, so we were up at 6am to pack the car and hit the road in the cool of the morning. We stopped in Tanunda to fuel up, then drove along the Sturt Highway travelling at 30-35 mph towards Daveyston.

I heard a massive explosion as we were hit from behind, and all I could see was the tourer roof as we were hurled off the road down an embankment into a paddock. According to the police, we were rear-ended by a driver that had fallen asleep behind the wheel, travelling at approximately 110kms/hr.

I yelled "What is happening?" Finally we stopped moving. I asked Ron "What happened?" He didn't know was his answer.

When I got out of the Dodge, I fell to the ground; my right leg wouldn't hold me up as my knee had impacted hard with the steering wheel.

On impact Ron's leg went through the windscreen, and he slid off the seat to the running board, bleeding profusely. He had a slash in his right leg from



3" below the knee down to the ankle and his left leg severely injured. I started looking around for rags to stop the bleeding and picked up and old shirt to apply a tourniquet.

Two truck drivers using their first aid kits were the first on the scene, and tended to us until the ambulances arrived. It was impossible for the vehicles to get into the paddock, so we were aided out in special chairs by the first responders. From there, we were taken to the Lyell McEwin hospital.

I spent 4 days in hospital with a busted rib, punctured lung, severe bruising from my knee hitting the steering wheel (due to a lack of seatbelts in the car), and whiplash. Ron fared worse, requiring two surgeries for the severe leg lacerations to his right leg, and a compound fracture to his left ankle.

On the 3rd day in hospital, to brighten us both up, a nurse took me in a wheelchair to visit Ron as he was in a different ward. I was discharged the following day, but Ron remained in hospital for altogether 8 weeks, eventually being flown back to the Whyalla hospital. He is still undergoing treatment for his injuries, but finally home and improving daily.

We both want to thank all of those that visited us in hospital, sent well wishes via cards or calls, and those who have given ongoing support.


